Proper Disposal of Compressed Gas Cylinders

- Mishandling or improper disposal of compressed gas cylinders, including general compressed gas cylinders, Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) cylinders and fire extinguishers, not only pollutes the environment and affects environmental hygiene, but also poses risks to public safety.
- No compressed gas cylinders shall be disposed of as general waste or irresponsibly discarded in public places or at refuse collection points.
- Used compressed gas cylinders should be returned to cylinder suppliers for handling. Alternatively, they should be sent to competent waste recyclers for recycling according to the conditions and types of cylinders, after pressure has been relieved.
- Any person who illegally disposes of any compressed gas cylinders in public places or at refuse collection points is liable to prosecution. Offenders are liable to:

A fixed penalty of HK\$1,500 under the Fixed Penalty (Public Cleanliness and Obstruction) Ordinance (Cap. 570)


A maximum fine of HK\$25,000 and imprisonment for 6 months under the Public Cleansing and Prevention of Nuisances Regulation (Cap. 132BK)

A maximum fine of HK\$200,000 and imprisonment of 6 months under the

Waste Disposal Ordinance (Cap. 354)

Handling of General Compressed Gas Cylinders

- Common compressed gas cylinders include refrigerant and helium gas cylinders. For information on the handling of LPG cylinders, please refer to the following page.
- Refillable compressed gas cylinders should be used as far as possible to reduce waste.
- Used compressed gas cylinders should be exhausted of any residual gas or substances before returning to the suppliers for handling.
- Exhausted gas cylinders with their pressure relieved can also be sent to competent waste recyclers for recycling. Information about the recyclers is available on the following webpage:





- LPG cylinders that have been used or no longer in use should be returned to LPG distributors as soon as possible.
- Any abandoned or unattended LPG cylinders should be reported to the respective registered gas supply companies via their 24-hour emergency hotlines for collection.

- All fire extinguishers shall be inspected by registered fire service installation contractors (RFSICs) at least once in every 12 months and undergo hydraulic pressure tests every five years.
- Expired or unserviceable fire extinguishers should be handed to the suppliers or RFSICs for inspection before reuse or recycling.
